A Bill to Increase Teacher Pay

1	BE II ENACI	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	ARTICLE 1.	All public and private school teachers shall receive a 10% increase in their

4		experience and continued education. These increases shall not be

A Bill to Improve Public Transportation to Lower Carbon Emissions

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	ARTICLE 1.	The U.S. Government will invest in and build eco-friendly public
3		transportation in large cities with the goal of reducing CO2 emissions by
4		50 in those cities by 2030.
5	ARTICLE 2.	A. Eco-friendly shall be defined as not releasing any CO2 during regular
6		operation.
7		B. Public transportation shall be defined as mass transit provided by the
8		city including but not limited to trains and busses.
9		C. Large cities shall be defined as cities whose metropolitan areas have a
10		population greater than 2.5 million.
11		D. CO2 emissions shall be defined as emissions of carbon dioxide arising
12		from the operation of vehicles.
13	ARTICLE 3.	This bill shall be carried out by the Department of Transportation in
14		conjunction with the state and local governments of affected cities.
15		A. 20% of the Highway Trust Fund shall be allocated annually each year
16		until 2030, or until CO2 emissions have been reduced by 50%,
17		whichever comes first.
18		B. Emissions shall be measured by the EPA in conjunction with the sate
19		and local officials and shall be measured in the same location each year
20	ARTICLE 4.	The bill will go into effect October 1, 2020
21	ARTICLE 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Establish Mental Health Programs in Schools

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	ARTICLE 1.	All state middle and high schools are now required to have mental health
3		programs that adequately address the mental illnesses of their students.
4		The federal government shall provide funds for the training and hiring of
5		qualified therapists.
6	ARTICLE 2.	A. State and local systems that receive any federal education funding are
7		subject to the revocation of such funds if they are deemed not to be in
8		compliance with this legislation.
9		B. Mental illnesses include but are not limited to depression; anxiety; drug
10		addiction, and eating, mood, and personality disorders.
11		C. A school is considered to have fulfilled the requirement of Article 1 when
12		they provide treatment and/or appropriate referrals that have aided at
13		least 75% of students deemed to be in need of assistance.
14	ARTICLE 3.	The Department of Education and the National Institute of Mental Health
15		(NIMH) will oversee the implementation of this legislation. The
16		Department of Education will disburse \$15 billion over three years for the
17		hiring and training of qualified therapists sufficient to address the
18		requirements of this legislation.
19		A. The NIMH shall create and enforce guidelines which define the
20		minimum qualifications for these therapists, as well as the required
21		standards of care.
22	ARTICLE 4.	The bill will go into effect within one year from the date of passage. The
23		bill's requirements, and the potential revocation of funding, shall take
24		effect within four years of passage.
25	ARTICLE 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Prisoners Rehabilitation Act of 2020

3		of G.E.D. programs and Pell grants to state and federal prisons. This shall
4		be made available to inmates who lack a high school diploma and/or
5		postsecondary education.
6	ARTICLE 2.	Participation in the program on the part of the states, prison systems, and
7		universities shall be voluntary and optional.
8	ARTICLE 3.	Adult inmates between the age of 18 and 65 who upon release will be no
9		older than 65 will be eligible to participate in this program.
10	ARTICLE 4.	The Department of Justice, Department of Education, and each
11		participating state's respective department of corrections shall be
12		responsible for the implementation of this legislation.
13		A. The Department of Education shall be responsible for selecting and
14		approving participating Universities.
15		B. The Department of Justice and each participating state's department of
16		corrections will be responsible for overseeing the inmates and their
17		classes.
18		C. This legislation shall draw necessary funds from the budget of the
19		Department of Education.
20	ARTICLE 5.	This bill will go into effect one year from the date of passage.
21	ARTICLE 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Require Full Beneficial Owner Disclosure for all Newly Formed Companies
